U of Waterloo Artist Survey

The University of Waterloo recently conducted a survey involving artists at 401 Richmond. The school is researching artists' studio in Toronto with the aim of making recommendations to various civic agencies for the development of further studio space for artists in the city. Currently, there are 12 practicing artists at 401.

Lois Lawson-Ellis

entered Lois Lawson-Ellis' art studio at 401 Richmond - a space not unlike that of a New York loft - to the sounds of marvellous classical music. Lois prepared a cup of tea for me and suggested I take some time to look at her work. What I saw were a series of large-scale drawings rendered in charcoal. Three pieces depicted cardboard boxes of various shapes and sizes with flaps open stacked upon each other. The effect was mesmerizing. Although representational in nature, the overall image was curiously abstract.

Regarding her choice in subject matter, Lois states, "My conceptual concerns have been directed thematically towards the notion of the contained space as a visual metaphor." Utilization of this motif stems from her desire to create an image which is expressive both on a psychological and metaphysical level.

"The works" says Lois, "attempt to encompass a variety of oppositions and formal contrasts. For example, chaos and order or darkness to light become metaphors for deeper thematic issues."

A graduate of the Ontario College of Art (1981), Lois has continued to pursue her career in the visual arts and exhibited in group and solo contexts. During her post-graduate year at OCA, Lois was fortunate to receive a scholarship

which allowed her to particiate in the Florence, Italy Off-Campus programme. "It was a rare opportunity," she observes, "to live, study and create work in a city which played such an instrumental role in shaping the development of Western Art. Lois completed her Bachelor of Arts degree at the University of Guelph, and, in 1986,

ioined the faculty staff at the Ontario College of Art.

Lois' current focus on "boxed imagery" was influenced while researching "assemblages/constructions" in 1989-90 to include in her newly restructured and expanded "Media" course. She discovered a text entitled: Art in Boxes. Although

> superficial in its survey format, the book nevertheless provided points of reference which she later examined in more depth. Much of Lois' source material was facilitated through the use of public/ private gallery catalogues and numerous visits to New York City book shops.

Since then, Lois admits, "I have been interested in the low reliefs, assemblages and constructions of the 20th century, particularly those found within the Dada and Neo-Dada Art Movements. There are elements within the works of assemblageoriented artists such as Arman and Nevelson that are of personal interest to me and, no doubt, have influenced aspects of my work and its creative process."


Lois first came to 401 Richmond West two and a half years ago. Some of the features which attracted her to the building were the high ceilings and wide freight elevators, important factors to consider when working with large-scale artworks.



Lois' Creative Process

mall preliminary sketches are done in graphite to isolate gesture and establish light and dark tonal patterns. These initial drawings are transferred to a large format (i.e., 10.5' x 6.5') on pre-toned paper which has been rubbed with charcoal to a medium grey value. Some of the charcoal is then lifted off with rags and erasers to create a light effect, and application of detailing follows. A black wooden frame construction and non-reflective "Den" glass are added to complete the work.







Mary Sutherland and Sam Kump

What a find! A couple with a background in health, safety, security and art(!) took up residence at 401 Richmond just two months ago. We count ourselves lucky.

Sam Kump and Mary Sutherland originate from Alberta (he from Calgary and she from Red Deer). They met four years ago in Edmonton and came to Toronto in 1993. Mary was already familiar with the city having been here previously for a short term as a nurse's aide with The Hospital for Sick Children. After receiving her R.N. back in Edmonton, she reapplied to Sick Kids and found a position in Medical

Specialties (e.g., liver disease, chest medicine, rheumatology, gastro-intestinal disorders, etc.). Sam, on the other hand, is an artist: "I was drawing since I could hold a pencil," he says. A student at the Ontario College of Art, he is currently in his second year focussing on sculpture and new media.

Sam has added talents of import to 401: he is experienced in renovations and furniture building. His father was the manager of a lumber yard, so he picked up several tips while working with him part-time. Later, he sold parts for a machine shop and helped construct a night club in Edmonton.

"This place is perfect for us," says Mary. "Sam needed a studio to work in, and we needed a place to live but couldn't afford a large enough space for both. Now, I can walk to work and Sam is minutes away from OCA." Adds Sam, "I always liked the building and the warehouse design. A few months ago, I stopped by to pick up some newsletters and heard that management was looking for someone as live-in security. The situation was ideal."

Sam and Mary are responsible for the building on nights and weekends when they take over from Mike Moody, the Building Manager. With his trusty Bouvier, Suki, Sam does rounds throughout the night. He handles emergencies, answers maintenance calls and looks after minor repairs where necessary. Sam and Mary can be reached at (416) 245-5544 with I.D.# 99587.

"We've lived in many apartment buildings and never met our neighbours," says Mary. "Here it's different. There's an open and friendly community atmosphere, and we feel we fit in."




Congratulations
