
Scott Thomas: 401's New Property Manager

ost of you were familiar with Tom Siklos, our former Property Manager, so when we heard from York Heritage Properties, our managament advisors at 401 Richmond, that Tom was no longer with them, we were concerned. Our fears were quickly allayed, however, when Scott Thomas showed up on the scene. "He's extremely knowledgeable and has a great deal of experience in all aspects of building management, ...an appreciation of the arts coupled with an understanding of people," says Margie Zeidler. "That's an important blend for anyone working in our building."

The mix of business and the arts is also reflected in Scott's

choice of education: He's got a Bachelor of Arts in Philosophy from the University of Western Ontario (1987) and a Masters in Business Administration from York University (1989). After graduation he joined York Heritage as Property Manager and is currently supervising five downtown buildings in addition to ours.

"401 Richmond is different from the other buildings I'm managing," claims Scott, proud father of Sam, age 1. "The tenants here are involved in the arts, media and communications, which makes it more creative for me and really fun to work with." Scott is looking after the trades, contractors and services to the building as well as tenant relations.

Paul Jones and Image Animation Canada Studio 386



he art of creating is a joy for me," says Paul Jones,
Creative & Managing Director of Image
Animation Canada and tenant at 401
Richmond since the Fall of 1994.

Originally from England, Paul developed a passion for make-up effects in childhood, "At 10 I became really interested in film (particularly Star Wars and horror flicks), and by 11 my hobby was make-up. I used to make my own Hallowe'en masks and sculpt life-size hands and heads." Paul landed in Art College in the north of England at 17, and a year later was hired by Image Animation in London where he worked at the famed Pinewood Studios (responsible for James Bond films, Legend, Interview with a Vampire, Little Shop of Horrors, etc.). Since that time, he has established an impressive list of "creative characters" including: Pinhead from Hellraiser III (1991) and the Assassins in Highlander II (1990).

Paul's position as Animatronics Coordinator for CTV's soon-to-beaired pilot *The Mighty Jungle* brought him to Toronto in 1993, where he met his wife, a producer with Alliance Productions. He became a landed resident last year, and on the advice of his boss of eight years, Bob Keen, started his own company, the Canadian arm of Image Animation.

Currently in the works and under a mid-June deadline are creatures and make-ups for the pilot series *F/X* by the L.A. producers of RoboCop. "It's quite a chaltenge," states Paul. "We're working on an alien costume with four arms - all animatronic (electronically wired and operated), a head and shoulders likeness of the lead actor, baby alien bursting out of an egg, 26 year old female who ages into a 65 year old male hobo, and White male of 175 lbs. who turns into a 250 lbs. Arab."

Handling both the business and creative components of the job appeals to Paul. "I like being in charge of all aspects of the company," he observes. "The management end takes me away from the creative, but I can always go back to being an artist. I know where work is, how to make contacts, and can recognize who's good. The key is to find people who love what they are doing and are talented in all areas: sculpting, moldmaking and painting." However, the

process of taking an idea and bringing it to life is not always easy, he concedes: "The only frustration is that we sometimes spend six months creating something that appears for five seconds (or not at all) on the screen. But, now I'm having more input into filming decisions."

Because of the recent F/X project, Paul's workshop has grown to seven artisans, a size he's says he's comfortable with: "I just don't want to lose track of why I got into what



I'm doing. I like to get a reaction out of people with the artworks I create - whether it's happiness or fear, but putting the process on film is only secondary. It was never to become a career for me. It's not a lust for power but a need to create things. The passion must always be there.

Paul's Creative Process

Everything is sculpted in clay (water or oil-based), then a mold is made (fiberglass, plastic, silicone). From that, the finished skin of the creature (the prosthetic or prop) is constructed and produced in foam latex, silicone or urethane. If foam rubber is used, then a waterbased paint called Pax is applied. The prop is either worn by the actor (glued to the face with medical glue) or it's animatronic (puppeteered by operators off camera using radio-controlled servo attached under the foam).
