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

### TIM PITSIULAK

We're saddened by the news of the recent passing of renowned Cape Dorset Inuit artist Tim Pitsiulak. While he was best known for his drawings depicting traditional and modern Inuit life and wildlife in the Arctic, he was also an extraordinary sculptor, photographer and lithographer. Last April, Open Studio (Studio 104) was fortunate to host Tim for a two-week creative residency exchange with Cape Dorset, the first in what they hope to be an ongoing partnership. During his residency, Tim collaborated with custom printer, Nick Shick, along with Miles Ingrassia, to create two large screenprints based on his iconic Artic wildlife drawings. Technical director, Anna Gaby-Trotz reflected on Tim's time at Open Studio, "Everyone he met was touched by his presence. His artistic ability, kindness, and unending humor lit up the studio...It is an absolute tragedy that the world has lost such a bright light." Tim leaves behind his loving wife Mary and seven children.



### **FAREWELL SCOTT!**

After an incredible 15-year run, **Scott Ferguson** recently announced that he is stepping down from his role as Executive Director at **Inside Out**. Under his leadership, the festival has grown from an organization with one full-time staff person, to the largest LGBT film festival in Canada! **Andria Wilson**, the co-founder of **OUTeast**, **Atlantic Canada's Queer Film Festival**, succeeds Scott as Executive Director, bringing with her extensive festival experience and a unique vision. On December 15, 2016, the **Toronto Star** published an article by **Murray Whyte** outlining 401 Richmond's tax assessment that imposed an 84% property tax increase for 2017. The increase undermines the model of affordability that we've aimed to preserve over the last twenty-three years. The outcry from citizens and tenants alike, and subsequent press attention, has been overwhelming and humbling, rallying support at various political and community levels. The response to the tax increase speaks to the value of the building and its community of artists, galleries, cultural producers and not-for-profits, who bring their creative vision, innovation and vibrancy to the city as a whole.



#### WHERE ARE THEY NOW

William Huffman may have ended his tenure as Administrative Director of A Space Gallery (Studio 110) in 1996, but he's still a familiar face at 401 Richmond. Since moving on, William has had an impressive career as an arts administrator at various institutions, including the Canadian Art Foundation, Toronto Arts Council, Canada Council of the Arts, and the West Baffin Eskimo Cooperative. Whether as a member of the Board of Directors for CARFAC (Studio 372), programming with Vtape (Studio 376) or helping with special projects at the Art Dealers Association of Canada (Studio 393), William has never truly departed from 401, crediting his success to the community network he developed at A Space. These days, it's not only the business of art that brings him to the building, it's the regular 401 Richmond walking tours he conducts – a volunteer initiative he's maintained for more than ten years! # tenant profile



### **BETWEEN THE LINES** Studio 277

Tucked away in a quiet corner on the second floor, **Between the Lines** (Studio 277) has called 401 Richmond home since 2010. A publishing house dedicated to challenging readers and the status quo for the last forty years, Between the Line (BTL) publishes Canadianauthored non-fiction books that offer a critical perspective on historical and contemporary social and cultural issues.

Founded in 1977, BTL started as a collaborative project between New Left activists at the Development Education Centre of Toronto and Dumont Press Graphix in Kitchener. Their first published title, The Big Nickel: Inco at Home and Abroad by Jamie Swift, set the tone for their press, and tackled the Canadian mining company's anti-union, environmentally destructive, and corrupt practices in Northern Ontario, Guatemala, and Indonesia. Since then, they have gone on to publish books on various critical topics, including public policy, international development, colonialism, media activism, and identity. By covering such an extensive range of issues, BTL remains in "constant dialogue with writers and activists about the most pressing issues of the day" explains BTL's accounts manager, Dave Molenhuis. In this way, it is BTL's deep connections to community and social movements that help inform what gets produced.

Structured as a collective informed by "sixties idealism," consensus on every aspect of operations. This approach sets them apart from other publishing houses, both in the content they produce, and in the way it has allowed them to endure and remain stable despite the economic challenges faced by many other Canadian publishing houses in today's economy.

BTL relocated to 401 Richmond in 2010, from another Toronto office. Drawn to the building for its community of artists and cultural groups, the move to "401 Richmond was a "natural fit," says Dave. The building's philosophy "happily complements" that of Between the Lines'.

This year marks BTL's 40th anniversary and they have several celebratory initiatives and events underway. Showcasing forty years of work, they will be publishing a graphic history documenting the roots of the publishing house, releasing digitized chapters of backlisted books on their website, and creating a video featuring interviews with BTL founders, former staff and authors.

When asked where they see themselves in another 40 years, Dave playfully replies "Existing for 40 years more would be good enough for us." Ultimately, they plan on continuing to bring to attention important social and political issues in Canada, and in particular, they see Indigenous rights and sovereignty as an increasingly critical topic to address within the current political climate. Dave explains "As long as there is an appetite for social change we'll continue to publish books about the latest issues and ideas working to that end."


