

IN THEIR OWN WORDS // ESMERALDA ENRIQUE



If you have ever travelled down to the lower level at 401 Richmond, you have probably been surprised by the sounds of rhythmic foot stamping, loud flamenco music and laughter filling the hallway. What you've stumbled upon is the Esmeralda Enrique Spanish Dance Company and our associated school, Academy of Spanish Dance.

Over 35 years ago, Esmeralda, a young woman from Texas, came to Toronto after spending 13 years in Spain perfecting her artistry as a flamenco dancer. While she founded her award-winning company and school in 1982 in Toronto, she found a true home for both at 401 Richmond in 1994.

The Academy of Spanish Dance offers a standard of excellence in training that is rewarding and enriching, accessible to all students, and enables them to acquire

new skills and reach higher goals. The school provides affordable evening and Saturday classes for adults from beginners to professionals and also has a popular children's program.

Esmeralda Enrique Spanish Dance Company,
Canada's premiere flamenco company, has developed an
ever-expanding repertoire that has earned both critical
and popular acclaim. With unique, talented dancers and
musicians from Canada and regular guest artists from
Spain, the company is recognized for the exceptional
level of its productions, receiving three Dora Mavor
Moore Awards in addition to numerous nominations
over the years. NOW Magazine readers voted EESDC
Toronto's Best Dance Company for 2015.

THEATRE ONTARIO Studio 350

Whether you're a recent graduate looking to make connections in the theatre community, or a mid-career actor wanting to learn how to produce your own show, **Theatre Ontario** can help you. One of the only art service organizations of its kind, Theatre Ontario is dedicated to supporting theatre communities across the province through education and advocacy.

Theatre Ontario was formed in 1971 as a response to the collapse of the **Dominion Drama Festival** and **Theatre Canada**, which left a gap in services for amateur and professional theatre communities across the province. Conceived as an organization offering membership, programs and services, for 46 years Theatre Ontario has supported all sectors of theatre: educational, professional and community.

Many of Theatre Ontario's programs focus on advocacy and providing networking opportunities to people at all stages of their careers, whether emerging, mid-career or senior artists. Executive Director, **Bruce Pitkin**, explains that most members seek out help with career transitions and Theatre Ontario's programming offers a variety of resources for the many directions artists may want to take their careers. Students graduating from conservatory theatre training programs can gain exposure to the professional world by attending Theatre Ontario's two-day **Next Generation Showcase**, which provides emerging artists with an opportunity to audition in front of 200 industry guests, while intensive mentorships are offered to midcareer artists who would like to further develop their craft. These initiatives complement other programming, such as

seminars on navigating the business of theatre, including grant writing, filing taxes, and building a brand as an artist.

Theatre Ontario's educational programming also speaks to some of the challenges artists face in Canada. Bruce explains that "being successful in this country is very difficult. You have to do many things, you can't just do one. Very few artists in this country are successful just through theatre." As the industry evolves, Theatre Ontario has adapted their services to meet the needs of the community, "developing new artists, new audiences, new creators" with the goal of making theatre accessible to more people.

One of the underlying beliefs of the organization is that theatre is an important and unique experience, and preserving it requires advocacy. Bruce points out that audiences play an important role in theatre: "Once you've seen a good piece of theatre – that stays with you for life. And you become an advocate for theatre because you realize what it can do in a very communal sense." Someone who experiences good theatre will be more likely to return, support other performances, promote theatre and even become involved in the community.

Theatre Ontario moved to 401 Richmond in 2012, and has stayed for the community. Bruce explains that working in a building with a diverse group of tenants has allowed Theatre Ontario to form connections outside of the industry: "the greatest thing is, it opens you up to things that you might not have ever thought of yourself, out of a chance conversation somewhere in the hallway."






