



C SANDRA LARONDE APPOINTED TO THE ORDER OF ONTARIO



RAINBOW RAILROAD Studio 236

With nearly 70 countries criminalizing same-sex intimacy around the world today, LGBTQI+ people are routinely arrested, denied basic human rights, and sometimes brutally attacked, tortured, or murdered. This is what faced sisters Kena and Sanchia living in their country of Barbados where being gay can result in life imprisonment and violent attacks are common. Enter **Rainbow Railroad**, the global non-profit organization that helps LGTBQI+ people facing persecution based on their sexual orientation, gender identity and sex characteristics. "When we decided we wanted to come to Canada, it came out of a dark place, to be honest, we were experiencing a lot of bad things," Kena shares.

Since it's founding in 2006 as a volunteer-run organization of diverse LGBTQI+ activists and human rights advocates – and with charitable status in Canada and the United States since 2013 and 2015 respectively – Rainbow Railroad has helped individuals find safety through emergency relocation and other forms of assistance. In 2021, Rainbow Railroad supported 1,812 people – the highest number of people the organization has helped of any year to date. The people they help are often experiencing police harassment, family violence, employment discrimination or forced conversion therapy. In some cases, they endure life-threatening attacks perpetrated by members of their own families or communities.

While Rainbow Railroad can't always relocate everyone who reaches out for help, they work with a global network of activists and human rights defenders on the ground to offer additional supports that include safe accommodation, medical care and travel documents. Jamaica is one of nine Caribbean countries that still criminalize same sex intimacy, and one of the first countries where Rainbow Railroad established a major operational presence and they continue to work in the region. The organization supports a safehouse in Jamaica that houses about a dozen individuals, keeping them safe as they prepare to relocate to a safer country with Rainbow Railroad's help. They also provide targeted cash assistance for things like passport application fees and other documentation, critical medical care including anti-retrovirals for those living with HIV, and other essential needs such as winter coats and suitcases.

As the arrival of the COVID-19 pandemic resulted in lockdowns, travel restrictions and border closures, the risks facing LGBTQI+ people in unsafe countries increased with reduced access to health care, more domestic abuse and heightened stigmatization; and Rainbow Railroad's work became more difficult than ever. In June of 2020, the advocacy group released a report on the impact of COVID-19 on displaced LGBTQI+ persons with four recommendations for policy makers. Based on research work from a partner organization and interviews

with human rights activists across the globe, Rainbow Railroad suggested that during the pandemic policy makers uphold the right to asylum, resume the resettlement of LGTBQI refugees, release LGBTQI+ asylum seekers in detention centres, and improve supports for LGBTQI+ refugees. Together with the report, the organization tackled the crisis by providing direct emergency livelihood supports, enhance the capacity of global partner agencies and human rights groups.

As the Taliban regained control of Afghanistan, LGBTQI+ people in the country have faced severe persecution including physical assaults, sexual violence and reported unlawful killings. Since August 2021 Rainbow Railroad has received more than 6,000 requests for help from LGBTQI+ Afghans. In that first year the organization relocated 230 individuals and helped a further 650 with financial, shelter, and mental health supports. After a year of advocacy and campaigning, as of December 2022, in partnership with the Government of Canada and the Ministry of Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship, Rainbow Railroad can facilitate resettling approximately 600 Afghans.

The critically important work Rainbow Railroad undertakes all around the world has received a significant amount of high-profile attention, helping to increase the effectiveness of the advocacy they undertake. In 2020, five folks that had been relocated by Rainbow Railroad were partnered up with the television show **Canadian**Drag Race contestants for drag makeovers, and in 2021

Canadian drag superstar **Scarlett Bobo** became an international ambassador for the organization. The British Olympic diver **Tom Daley** launched a Pride collection on his **Made With Love** fashion label in 2022 with all proceeds going to Rainbow Railroad. **Scotiabank** also recently signed on to a three-year \$495,000 partnership to help provide direct assistance to LGBTQI+ people in need globally, supporting the organization as it develops connections with like-minded groups at home and around the world including countries where Scotiabank operates.

Most recently, Rainbow Railroad was included as a consultative partner with the Biden administration to help develop the United States (US) government program Welcome Corps that allows individual Americans to privately sponsor refugees from around the world. As a large step forward in the US government's plan to advance the LGTBQI+ rights globally, this program will help at-risk LGBTQI+ people find safe homes across the US.

While Rainbow Railroad has played an enormous role in supporting and saving the lives of LGTBQI+ people around the world, they were still on track to receive 10,000 requests for help in 2022 from LGBTQI+ people whose lives are in danger. Knowing first-hand how Rainbow Railroad ensured their path to a safe life in Canada, sisters **Kena** and **Sanchia** now enjoy a life in Toronto where they live openly as who they are. According to Sanchia, "Rainbow Railroad was that opening for me."



KENOJUAK ASHEVAK

An icon within Canadian art history, **Kenojuak Ashevak** (1927–2013) was a first generation Inuit creator and one of the founding members of **West Baffin Cooperative**, an organization critical to the establishment of a visual arts industry in **Kinngait** (formerly **Cape Dorset**), **Nunavut**.
