ARTIST CATE MCGUIRE BACK FOR DESIGNTO 2024




Former Red Head

ROCKY DOBEY IN CBC DOC

Artist Rocky Dobey was featured in an eight-and-a-half minute CBC.ca documentary as part of a new series about street art called *Public Display*. Rocky has been installing art in the streets of Toronto since he was a shoeshine boy on Yonge Street in the 1970s. Joining the construction trade as an ironworker in his twenties gave him access to the scrap copper he transforms into metal monuments, plaques and sculptures across the city. Filmmaker Kate Colenbrander was intrigued by Rocky's work noting, "I think what really struck me is that Rocky was memorializing people and places in a city where things are really quickly turned over and forgotten about."

A VALUABLE INTERNSHIP EXPERIENCE AT 401 RICHMOND



The University of Toronto's website published an article by **Kelly Zhang**, a fourth-year undergraduate student majoring in Art History, and minoring in English and Visual Studies, chronicling her time as an intern at 401 as part of

Reflecting on the experience, Kelly notes "Although I was nervous in the beginning of my placement, I now have more confidence in my skills and a larger network to help me achieve my ideal career."

LE LABO / LE LABORATOIRE D'ART Studio 277

"We're all here together for of the love of art and the language," says **Eléonore Donati** of **Le Labo** francophone media arts centre. A space for artistic experimentation and production in the field of media arts, interdisciplinary and digital art, also known as le Laboratoire d'Art, Le Labo is Toronto and Ontario's only francophone media arts production and presentation centre.

In 2001, as a member of BRAVO-Sud, the southern arm of le Bureau des Regroupements des Artistes Visuels de l'Ontario, filmmaker and producer Babek Aliassa recognized the desire of French-speaking media artists to have a place and a program that would meet their specific needs. Over the next 3 years he worked with fellow artists organizing countless meetings, writing grants and gathering support. In 2004, their efforts were rewarded with two major grants from the Ontario Trillium Foundation and Heritage Canada. This kicked off the artists taking charge of their association and putting into practice what they'd imagined in the preceding years: the creation of a visual and legal identity, the development of projects and collaborations, setting up of training courses, and more. Nicole Croiset, Dominique Banoun, Alex Loukos, Joseph Muscat, Denis Leclerc, Marc Audette, Mireille St-Cyr and Dante Lacarde, among others, got the centre up and running. Le Labo officially seceded from BRAVO in 2006 to become an autonomous and formally incorporated

organization, and has been supporting incubation, innovation, creation and production in Toronto's media arts scene ever since.

Over 17 years, Le Labo's original 10 members have grown to 80 media artists reflecting a diverse francophone community spanning age, gender and background. With French-speaking artists arriving in Canada as immigrants from countries across the globe, Le Labo is uniquely positioned to support their integration into Toronto and Ontario's arts fabric. Membership comes with reciprocal privileges with Charles Street Video and Trinity Square Video including access to equipment rentals and workshops. Le Labo offers multi-tiered levels to join their community including reduced fees for younger adults and newcomers, and free membership for Inuit, Métis and First Nations artists.

Le Labo's main goal is to support Francophone artists in the region at the moment of their artistic creation. As Toronto has many presentation spaces, and a portion of the organization's membership has existing relationships with other galleries to show their work, Le Labo recognized a different need for space, time and resources for their artist community to produce and further their practice. Le Labo's second floor studio is divided into two spaces: a small office area for both their Executive Director, Dyana Ouvrard, and Arts Administrator, Eléonore Donati, and a larger space

designated for their residency program Le Cercle, and membership use overall. Lasting a few weeks or a month, Le Labo's residencies prioritize providing: space and suitable resources based on an artist's individual practice along with artist fees for their time in the studio; opportunities for artistic discussion, feedback, and exchange with curators and peers; and a galvanizing program for the membership to come together and support one another.

The importance of an artist creating work in their first language was explored in a 2018 Le Labo program entitled *The Third Tongue*. The curatorial project, commissioned by Le Labo and curated by **Carolina Reis**, included film screenings, an exhibition, and a panel discussion that explored the notion of a 'third tongue' as a language that emerges from the co-existence of two languages. The series investigated the unique experience of living and creating artwork in the context of two languages, especially artists living within a linguistic minority. The project highlighted the importance of an organization like Le Labo supporting Francophones in Canada's artistic fabric.

Throughout the school year, Le Labo conducts
French and bilingual media art workshops in primary and
secondary schools in Francophone communities across
the country, including Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan
and British Columbia. The sessions aim to introduce
youth to the origins of media art and prepare them to
better understand the medium, thereby giving them tools
to create photographs, video and digital work that
communicates their histories and cultures. The program
also provides Le Labo members with an opportunity to
educate and engage with youth in French and English.

Moving in to 401 Richmond in 2018, Le Labo has actively partnered with aligned tenants. This past summer, Le Labo's ED Dyana conducted bilingual tours at the Toronto Outdoor Art Fair, whose office is across the hall from Le Labo. Dyana introduced attendees to Francophone artists exhibiting at the fair while encouraging a slow approach to appreciating art. And, Le Labo partnered with Images Festival, also part of the 401 community, hosting a screening of Song for the New World by Miryam Charles for the duration of the festival including a live virtual chat with the artist.

Most recently, Le Labo launched 6 degrees: A
Feminist Letter Writing Project, an invitation to write
a letter to ask questions about identity, gender and
patriarchy, in any language. The project kicked off with
an exhibition in Le Labo's space in March 2023
displaying letters by artists Noémie Roy, Julie
Lassonde, Sophie Dumesny and Éveline Boudreau
and a station with a typewriter, paper and pens for
anyone to contribute their own letter, which can also be
received by email or post. Le Labo replicated the
exhibition and collaborative project for Nuit Blanche at
401 Richmond with hundreds of attendees adding their
letters to the initiative. The project will culminate in an
exhibition of the letters in Le Labo's studio in March 2024.

Looking ahead, Le Labo has prioritized introspection and discovery, over perceived goals of success. With a full 2023/2024 programming season developed alongside a notion of cultivation, Le Labo's team aims to sow seeds for the future including increased organizational collaborations, onsite exhibitions, film screenings, and external growth opportunities for their membership.

O JILLIAN AND MARIKO TAMAKI


The title of cousins Jillian and Mariko Tamaki's graphic novel *Roaming* is a play on words: the young protagonists roam through New York City while worrying about roaming charges on their cell phones. *Roaming* has received critical acclaim across major news outlets including *The Globe and Mail*, *The Grind*, CBC, and *The New York Times*. Says Jillian, "I knew I wanted to do something on travelling with your friends when you're young and your horizons are being expanded."

CIMAGINENATIVE

ImagineNATIVE Film and Media Arts Festival celebrated its 24th edition in the midst of a financial crunch. As reported in *The Globe and Mail*, "This is the first year in my time here where I've had the funds we expect to get not come through, or come in reduced," says Executive Director Naomi Johnson. "It's like that for most nonprofits, all compounded by inflation and the cost of being in Toronto, particularly for hotels. Our average hotel room booking last year was \$189 a night. This year it's \$350."


performance festival plays *i am your spaniel*—by Winnipeg performance collective We Quit Theatre—and Lady M caught the attention of The Toronto Star this past summer for their "fresh takes on Shakespeare." *i am your spaniel* took the form of a lecture in which a transgender man plays a female academic named Gislina Patterson. Lady M, the inaugural production of 1s1 Theatre—a deaf-led company founded by deaf actor Jani Birley—reinterpreted Shakespeare's Macbeth with a new kind of theatre language visually adapted for the stage accommodating both deaf and hearing audiences.
