
# CDCC AND TSV PARTNER WITH DIASPORIC FUTURISMS

Critical Distance Centre for Curators and Trinity
Square Video have partnered with the curatorial
collective Diasporic Futurisms to launch Temporal
Tempest, a virtual database that showcases visual
art, sound art, media art, and documentation of
curatorial projects that materialize the genre of diasporic
futurisms. The project was developed to understand and
disseminate how artists and organizations are utilizing
and engaging with themes of diasporic futurisms in
Canadian arts culture. The database kicks off with
twelve projects by arts practitioners across Canada.



#### ORDER OF CANADA FOR GOG ED

Zainub Verjee, the Executive Director of Galeries Ontario/Ontario Galleries has been appointed to the Order of Canada, awarded by the Office of the Governor General of Canada. The distinguished honour recognized Zainub for advancing representation and equitable policy legislation within Canada's arts and culture sector as a leading artist, administrator and critic. "I am absolutely delighted by this honour. I hope this will help to shine a light on the needs of the arts and plight of the artists who are affected by the systemic precarity, and on the fact that arts advocacy makes a tangible difference", says Zainub. Zainub is already a laureate of the 2020 Governor General's Visual and Media Arts Award for Outstanding Contribution.



#### KRIS KNIGHT'S BIG REVEAL

In the Fall 2023 401 Update Tenant Profile, Kris Knight hinted at his latest project working as a shadow painter for an actor playing an artist in a feature-length movie. While he wasn't at liberty to reveal the movie or the actor last fall, we now know Kris' artwork appears in Good Grief starring Dan Levy. As Kris recalls, "Dan called me out of the blue in July of 2022-we had never met before, but I knew he was a collector of my work... at the end of our phone call, he asked me if I would collaborate with him and create paintings for the film, a somewhat ghost painter for his character Marc." Once the studies were done in pre-production, Kris had a couple of months to create a show's worth of work before shipping them to London, UK where the movie was partially shot. Kris then followed the paintings to London to assist the film's art department with setting up the main character's art studio and gallery exhibition. On the gallery set, Kris noticed that no one had been cast as the gallery's attendant for the final exhibition reception scene, and so he offered himself up to land a cameo in the movie. Kris came by the role honestly: "Passing out exhibition statements, price lists and glasses of white wine during exhibition openings was what I did the first Thursday night of each month for years when I was a gallery assistant, so it wasn't that much of a stretch." 401 Fun Fact: Dan's Dad Eugene Levy had a writing

#### IMAGINENATIVE FILM + MEDIA ARTS FESTIVAL Studio 446

After being approached in the mid-90s by a video maker and performance/installation artist Zachery Longboy (Sayisi Dene), the video distribution organization Vtape, co-founded and led by Lisa Steele and Kim Tomczak, began building a dedicated collection of videos by Indigenous artists. Together with Vtape's Wanda Vanderstoop, Zachery helped develop the significant body of work as Vtape's Aboriginal Outreach Coordinator and was succeeded in the role by Cynthia Lickers-Sage, a Haudenosaunee artist and producer from Six Nations. In 1998, Cynthia worked to broaden the collection's reach with the exhibition of short film and video work by Indigenous artists at Vtape. imagineNATIVE subsequently became its own entity in 2000.

In its first decade, imagineNATIVE worked with Ojibwe critic and journalist Jesse Wente as a programmer and a member of imagineNATIVE's Board of Directors. "When I joined imagineNATIVE in the early days, it was largely attended by an Indigenous audience here in Toronto—pretty dedicated, small-ish group of people," recalled Jesse when talking to Rosanna Deerchild on CBC Radio in 2016. Anishinaabe film producer Jason Ryle also served as a programmer and Board member in those early years and joined the organization as its Executive Director in 2010.

imagineNATIVE would see tremendous growth under Jason's decade of leadership, achieving the status of the world's largest presenter of Indigenous film and media arts while further advancing its mandate to support

Indigenous filmmakers and media artists in Canada and internationally. Jason led the team to partner with funders, broadcasters, and other festivals, elevating imagine-NATIVE to the status of a key artistic, public, and industry festival. When Jason was ready to move on from imagineNATIVE, he worked with the organization's board to hire Niki Little (Anishininew/British descent from Kistiganwacheeng) as Artistic Director and Naomi Johnson (Mohawk from Six Nations), as Associate Director. Jason mentored Naomi Johnson in her role as Associate Director for one year before she moved into her role as Executive Director in 2020.

During the Festival and throughout the year, imagineNATIVE presents robust programming that includes the imagineNATIVE Institute, an organizational department working to address gaps in the industry and build capacity for Indigenous creatives. With a **Netflix** partnership brokered by Jason in 2019, the Institute offers year-round Indigenous-led professional development programs, events and talks, and also hosts the Festival's Industry Days with panel discussions, masterclasses, and networking events.

Furthering the Festival's reach, the imagineNATIVE Tour Program, which recently launched again for 2024 bookings, brings Indigenous-made film works and engagement activities to communities across Canada. Schools, workplaces, and community groups can book screenings curated from the most recent Festival for presentation in-person or online.



Looking back to 2020 when Naomi took the reins as imagineNATIVE's Executive Director, the organization moved into operating a film festival in the midst of a global pandemic. The intent and incentive for continuing with an online presentation were knowing that artists and arts workers would be paid over two extraordinarily challenging years. The team quickly maneuvered forward with a fully online festival, including filming the experience of visiting art exhibitions for the annual Art Crawl event at A Space Gallery and Trinity Square Video, and livestreaming accompanying events for both the films and exhibitions. The team also leveraged the shift to an online festival to launch the iNdigital Space, an online platform presenting a curated selection of virtual reality, 360 media, augmented reality, video games, interactive web projects, and digital media produced by Indigenous creators. In 2022, the Festival returned in-person, but with a new hybrid model that embraces the benefits of experiencing the Festival in the digital sphere. The 2023 Festival took place in Toronto at the TIFF Lightbox for a week before moving to online streaming and the iNdigital Space platform for another week. Upon the completion of the 2022 Festival the imagineNATIVE board was supportive of reinstating the Associate Director position with the promotion of David Morrison (Dene) into this leadership position in 2023.

This past year's Festival also included the **iNdigital Space** as a free-to-experience in-person showcase in the TIFF Lightbox Gallery. The gallery installation featured imagineNATIVE arcade games created by the iNdigital Youth Collective available for play. The iNdigital Youth Collective operates with a collaborative spirit to engage Indigenous youth in a community-focused approach, fostering creativity, technical skill, and confidence, empowering Indigenous youth and growing the next generation of Indigenous voices in digital media.

As imagineNATIVE's programming expanded in its reach and impact, the awards and accolades began to arrive with increasing regularity. In 2017, imagineNATIVE

won a Vital Ideas Award from the Toronto Community Foundation, and in 2018 the highly competitive and prestigious Premier's Awards for Excellence in the Arts from the Ontario Arts Council (finalist in 2009 and 2015). In the summer of 2023, before the 24th Festival. Cynthia Lickers-Sage, Lisa Steele, Kim Tomczak, and Wanda Vanderstoop were honoured at the Canadian Honours Ceremony in Ottawa with a Meritorious Service Cross presented by Governor General Mary Simon for their work and efforts in establishing the imagineNATIVE Film + Media Arts Festival, 2023 also marked a noteworthy year for Naomi Johnson, receiving the Margo Bindhardt and Rita Davies Cultural Leadership Award from the Toronto Arts Foundation. The award, presented in Spring 2023, was in recognition of Naomi's strong leadership as imagineNATIVE's Executive Director and her contributions to Toronto's cultural landscape.

Throughout imagineNATIVE's remarkable growth across their nearly 25-year trajectory, the organization has called 401's fourth floor home, now located within The Commons media arts cluster. "We love being in close proximity to Vtape and Reel Asian, and having The Commons as an area for gathering all year round," says Festival Director Lindsay Monture (Mohawk from Six Nations). Lindsay joined imagineNATIVE in May 2023 to lead the Festival team, following numerous prior imagineNATIVE contracts in various roles spanning from 2013 to 2017, and a stint working with Naomi at the Woodland Cultural Centre before either joined imagineNATIVE. Having a home base at 401 in downtown Toronto is a real draw for imagineNATIVE and the filmmakers and artists it hosts. Lindsay remarks, "Everything is so accessible. For guests who may not be used to the big city there's lots to discover within a five, ten, or fifteen minute walk from the building. Being in the city can be intimidating. It's a relief for guests to come in to visit us. Where we are in the city of Toronto, it's the perfect spot."
